ROAD SAFETY FOCUS

RET have been out across the county conducting rural speeding checks.

In April the team conducted multiple checks at locations across Thurrock, South Ockendon, Epping Forest, Tendring and Colchester.

One day in Tendring and Colchester saw 32



drivers prosecuted for offences ranging from speeding to using mobile phones whilst

driving.

RET regularly speak to local Community Policing Teams and parish councils to identify problem roads and take action.

Four car's were seized for having no insurance in April.

The four most common causes of road deaths in Essex are speeding, not wearing a seatbelt, using a phone and drink or drug driving.





Domestic abuse is all about control.

STOLEN VEHICLES

RET have been active tracing stolen vehicles, trailers and plant throughout April.

A Land Rover Discovery stolen from Hutton was found by the team hidden in a carpark in Chelmsford.



A chipper stolen in Essex was recovered during a joint operation with Cambridgeshire Rural Crime Action Team.



The teams joined together to tackle cross boarder criminals and disrupt their activities.

The team recovered a stolen dumper truck that had been crashed into a hedge and abandoned.



And a quad bike taken in Ramsden Heath was found after a search by the team.



Community Policing Teams across the county make the team aware of stolen vehicles from rural locations and the team actively search for them.

During April the team recovered 9 stolen vehicles.

WILDLIFE TRAINING DAY

PC Raven, our resident Wildlife Crime Officer arranged a multiagency wildlife training day for partner agencies and other police forces.

The day at Hanningfield Reservoir aimed to upskill police and partners around wildlife crime and issues.

The British Association for Shooting and Conservation (BASC), the Environment Agency and Essex Police ran stalls focusing on key areas such as firearms licencing, traps, deer poaching, fishing and responsible shooting.

The day was well attended with staff from the



Metropolitan and Suffolk Police and a huge range of agencies present.

HUNTING CAUTION

A male legally hunting in Essex has been given a conditional caution following an investigation by RET.

The team found he had shot two ducks and a partridge. These birds cannot be hunted at this time of year due to it being 'closed season'.

The shooter was not aware of the law in



relation to what quarry can be shot at different times of the year, and was not able to identify different bird species.

April saw the team attend the Writtle Parish Council AGM where we presented on RET's role.



We also caried out a combined dog and heritage event at Gosbecks Archaeological Park in Colchester.
